Abraham Lincoln talked about his mother, who read him the Scriptures at a very young age. Susanna Wesley, whose two sons became the famous John and Charles, selected the Bible as the first book her children would ever read. Suzanne Edwards, wife of the famous 18th century clergyman Jonathan Edwards, was another mother who displayed this sort of vital interest in developing her children in the ways of the Lord. Many of them went on to become college presidents, professors, lawyers, judges, and holders of public office, even a vice president of the United States. In each case, as busy as these mothers were without any modern conveniences like dishwashers and washing machines, these mothers took time to teach their children!

Theodore Roosevelt said, "When all is said and done, it is the mother, and the mother only, who is a better citizen than the soldier who fights for his country. ... The mother who does her part in rearing and training aright the boys and girls who are to be the men and women of the next generation, is of greater use to the community, and occupies, if she only would realize it, a more honorable as well as more important position than any man in it. She is more important, by far, than the successful statesman, or businessman, or artist, or scientist."

She seeks practical things for the home and works willingly with her hands. (She can do without the latest new kitchen gadget.)

She rises while it is yet night (no oversleeping) so she can spend time with the Lord, which enables her to give her children spiritual food. She sends them on their way prepared in the Lord for the day.

She considers a good bargain and buys it. She is a wise business woman. She is not ashamed to shop at Kmart instead of Macy's when she can save some extra money. (She is not "born to shop"!) From her saved money she makes a good investment. She girds herself with strength. She is spiritually fit and physically fit. (By working hard she doesn't need to do aerobics.)

She is content that she has done a good job (her "self-esteem" comes from her labors) and her lamp does not go out at night. She extends her hand to the poor around her. Yes, she reaches out her hands to the needy. She looks for needs and opportunities to serve and is not just into herself. (Her kids also serve with her.)

She is not fearful or afraid. She and her household are clothed with the armor of God. They are ready for battle. She makes things and sells them. She is able to make extra money by watching kids, cleaning houses, teaching music lessons, laundering, typing, taking care of elderly (or a number of other ways to be at home with the children).

She is full of good works and has the joy of the Lord. She opens her mouth with good, sound advice, and on her tongue is never the neighborhood gossip. But the law of kindness is on her tongue.

She watches well over the ways of her household. She does not have time for mindless soap operas or game shows. She is not lazy or idle (or does not talk too much on the phone). Her house is neat and orderly, but she is not a fanatic. Her



children rise up and say, "Mom, you're awesome!" Her husband also, and he says, "Baby, you're the greatest! There are many great women out there, but you've got them all beat!"

She doesn't care if she doesn't look like she just walked out of a beauty parlor or stepped off a magazine cover. She knows that is empty, because her true beauty comes from Jesus shining through her. The figures may all go to pot, the hair-styles flop, but she has what will make people sit up and take notice. She does keep up her appearance, and her family does look nice, but she has eternal values and goals which make her far more valuable in God's eyes.

What was it You saw in me that made You call my name, yet so often I fail to see my son just the same.

Someday he'll be a man of God, but today no fruit I see. Oh God, let not my selfishness hinder what he could be.

A wretched sinner was I, yet You walked on earth for me. Why can't I give my life for my son, patient and lovingly?



Here are some good questions to ask yourself...

- 1. Since my house is an extension of myself, what is it portraying (neat or sloppy, a caring touch or lack of attention)?
- 2. What is the main focus or center attraction of my home? Is it the TV or the Bible? (Godly oriented or worldly oriented?)
- 3. What is the atmosphere of my home? Is it tense or relaxing? Is it a haven and a refuge? Or is it hectic and noisy?
- 4. Are the children a help in the home or a hindrance? Have they been taught chores and responsibility? How well trained are they?
- 5. Do my husband and children feel loved and appreciated when they walk in the door or do they feel like intruders on "my time"? (Your life is not your own.)
- 6. Do I guard my time with the Lord jealously so that I will be the wise, loving, patient mother I should be? ("...without Me you can do nothing," John 15:5, yet "I can do all things through Christ Who strengthens me," Philippians 4:13.)
- 7. How hospitable am I? Do I reach my hands out to the poor and needy of my neighborhood? (Some may never go to church, but they will come to your house for dinner.) Am I a light in my neighborhood?
- 8. How well do I know each child? (Their strengths and weaknesses?)
- 9. Do I look well to the ways of my household? ie Do I discipline when it needs to be done? (Proverbs 29:15... "a child left to himself brings shame to his mother.")
- 10. Am I teaching and modeling Jesus Christ to my children?
- 11. Do I rule over my own spirit when stretched with time pressure, fatigue, and unruly children?



Mothers, God never gives us a command without giving the wisdom and ability to follow through with it. Isaiah 40:11 says, "He will feed His flock like a shepherd; He will gather the lambs with His arm, and carry them in His bosom, and gently lead those who are with young." Deuteronomy 6:6-7 says, "And these words which I command you today shall be in your heart: (to love the Lord your God with all your heart); you shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, when you walk by the way, when you lie down, and when you rise up."

Mothers, you are the best teacher your child could ever have. Don't sell yourself short.

Those of you mothers with young children, train them now, before it is too late. Children are like wet cement, shapeable and moldable for a short period of time. Those of you mothers that say it is too late for that or that you wish you could do it over - prayer can reach the most unteachable heart. How often do you pray and intercede for your children?



Mothers with Older Children

Mothers with older children, you can still have a great and mighty influence in their lives, through PRAYER. How much time do you spend interceding for them and their friends as well? All hell cannot tear a child away from a praying mother.
