PAUL SENT TO ITALY

Luke, the writer of Acts and travel companion of Paul, left the Apostle in the hands of James and the elders of the Jerusalem church (Acts 21:18). Paul was arrested in Jerusalem and detained in Caesarea for two years. The beloved physician always stood by him (Colossians 4:14). Being a Roman citizen, Paul appealed to Caesar, so King Agrippa sent him on a sea voyage to Italy. When Paul was shipped off to Rome, Luke joined him for the voyage.

⁷ Sidon: sixty geographical miles up the coast from Caesarea.

⁸ shelter of Cyprus: area north of the island of Cyprus and the mainland where there is a break for the force of the winter storms.


